Message from the Principal

Kai ora Parents and Caregivers,

Yesterday I had a meeting with Julie Anderson, (Director of Education, Otago/Southland) and Nancy Bell, (Deputy Secretary of Education). Nancy was interested in discussing the current Ministry of Education initiatives as well as our practices here at Elmgrove, especially around Mathematics. It was great to be able to share with them our practices and results having completed 3 years of mathematics professional development. I did voice my concerns with her about the suggestion a one size fits all workbook approach would better serve our students, and my disappointment that the current announcements the government are making do not provide clarity. Its unclear where they have drawn their statistics from and what they mean. This data provided by our Prime Minister suggesting only 22% of Year 8 students are able to meet the mathematics curriculum expectations were taken from a sample of less than 1000 students which is 0.02% of the primary school student population and measured against an elevated expectation, in line with the new draft curriculum which has not yet been released to schools. Dr Charles Darr who was responsible for collecting this data made the following statement.

"What we are seeing in mathematics is a change in curriculum and a new benchmarking process, rather than a change in achievement. We've been tracking student achievement in mathematics at Year 8 for more than 10 years, and in that time, there has been no evidence for improvement or decline. We do have a new draft curriculum however, the provisional benchmarking exercise we carried out indicates it requires a higher level of proficiency than the 2007 curriculum" Dr Charles Darr. I agree that we need to take action on student achievement in mathematics as a nation and welcome further professional development funding and intervention for our struggling children. Elmgrove has been committed to this for the last 3 years and I am proud of our progress. Data published to the Ministry at the end of 2023 showed that we had 81% of our students achieving the current curriculum expectation in mathematics and 86% by the end of Year 6. Once we have the refreshed mathematics curriculum documents we will begin the work on implementing the revised expectations and further building our children's achievement levels.


